We live in a time when key policy changes could transform our food culture and agriculture economy while solving multiple serious challenges. There are millions of people who need access to healthier food and every single community must become much more resilient in order to cope with the unfolding climate crisis. The best option for generating the public funds to increase healthy food access and more resilient local food production is a 2-cent per ounce tax on <u>harmful sugary beverages</u>. But the money from Big Soda has blunted our efforts for over half a decade. Just see this year's killed bill list below.

### Big Soda Killed All These Sugar-Sweetened Beverages Bills in 2019

**AB 138 (Bloom)** - California Community Health Fund (tax)

**AB 764 (Bonta)** - Sugar-sweetened beverages (limiting advertising)

**AB 765 (Wicks)** - Healthy Checkout Aisles for Healthy Families Act

**AB 766 (Chiu)** - Unsealed beverage container portion cap

**SB 347 (Monning)** - Sugarsweetened beverages: safety warnings

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# **Policy Update**

As of today, and following the victories related to the Healthy Soils Program and



the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Act, only one of our priority bills remains alive. It has been a tough year for healthy and sustainable food policy goals.

#### <u>AB 842</u> Hunger-Free Preschool. Monique Lemon (Santa Barbara) and Susan Eggman (Stockton)

Ensures that all low-income, public preK students have access to a free- or reduced-price meals and all childcare providers utilizing the Child Care Food

Program receive supplemental state funding.

On SENATE Floor. Must pass by Friday to reach the Governor for his consideration and signature within 30 days.
