Regenerative Meat Tasting Event & Dinner Celebrating Local Meats


As a follow up to our regenerative meat summit in Sacramento in June and as a response to the supply chain needs emerging from that meeting, we are bringing together **producers**, **processors**, **buyers**, **butchers and chefs for a full day workshop** to connect and learn from each other and further impact the supply chain to benefit small to mid-size producers.

The workshop will take place in Novato on March 11. It is followed by a reception with a blind tasting of previously frozen and fresh ribeye steaks (to hopefully prove our hypothesis that there is no difference in taste), and a delicious dinner celebrating local regenerative meat. Both the reception/meat tasting event and the dinner are open to the public.

Flipping the Table Podcast

Rick Clark, a large-scale
Midwestern regenerative organic
farmer from Indiana, shares his
story of transition away from
conventional commodity
agriculture to the center of the film
Common Ground.

A 5th generation commodity crop farmer from Indiana, the Heartland of America, Rick Clark had an awakening during a one-inch rain event in 2007 that washed topsoil from his fields. That moment spawned a ten-year journey during which Rick created rich healthy soil that captures carbon and holds water, diversified his crops and increased his profits. This success placed him at the center of the film Common Ground. As the film says, Rick "cracked the code" of large-scale organic regenerative farming.
