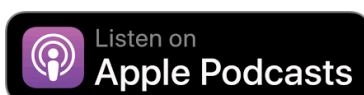
We hope you're finding some relief from this intense heat wave that's been gripping California!

With 30 tons of Roundup used annually in Sonoma County – 97% on wine grapes – this investigative documentary ‘Children Of the Vine’ couldn’t be timelier. We are pleased that the film highlights more sustainable farming practices that don’t put public health at risk and are capable of feeding the world.

Shot primarily in the wine regions of Napa and Sonoma Counties, the film will be shown one day only on **Tuesday, October 11 at 6:30 PM at the Rialto, Sebastopol**. The screening will be followed up with a panel of local experts and the director, to answer questions and discuss options for non-toxic farming practices. The panel will include Brian Lilla, Filmmaker; Megan Kaun, Sonoma Safe Agriculture Safe Schools (SASS); Derek Trowbridge, Old World Winery.
