Enthusiasm for our Regenerative Meat Project is Spreading Across NorCal!

As we travel through Northern California to meet with ranchers for our <u>USDA</u> <u>funded meat supply chain project</u>, we are reaching a critical mass in terms of numbers of ranchers interested in participating in transforming the regional meat supply chain and processing capacities with the goal to improve resilience, social equity and rural economic health.

Since not all ranchers are available to attend in-person meetings, we recently offered a **virtual meeting**. **Over 60 ranchers** participated showing support and great enthusiasm for the project and generating excellent conversations. Additionally, we went to **Jamestown in the Sierra Foothills** on April 5th **to meet with ranchers from Tuolumne and Calaveras counties**. Below are a few photos from these two events.

Two California Assembly Committees Give Green Light to AB 408

On March 29, AB 408 passed out of the **California Assembly Agriculture Committee** on a bipartisan vote of 10-0, and an April 10, it passed out of the **Assembly Natural Resources Committee** with a bipartisan vote of 10 - 1!

AB 408 is authored by Assemblymember Lori Wilson and would place a**\$3.4 billion bond measure** on the November 2024 ballot which, if passed by voters, would invest in a more equitable and climate resilient food and farming system.

The bond bill is sponsored by the <u>Food & Farm Resilience Coalition</u>, 18 organizations (ROC is one of them) advocating for food access, environmental justice, sustainable agriculture, labor and public health. The bond bill has also received official support from over 85 organizations and several co-author sign ons. Read the full press release <u>here</u>.




